PROGRAM MANAGER'S REPORT

It is with great pride that we reflect on another year of growth at Bluebird Foundation, with our Community Programs touching more than 1,000 people in the Geelong community each and every week. While growth has never been our goal in and of itself, more and more individuals, families and organisations are reaching out in need of our services.

After COVID lockdowns and restrictions, more parents and carers have been seeking joyful ways to create meaningful connections with other families and develop their skills and confidence in being the first and most important teacher for their babies, toddlers and preschoolers. In 2022, the youngest members of our community experienced what it is to make music together, explore gloriously messy art-making processes and play in the mud with friends for the very first time.

Teachers and schools have needed strategies to support the social and emotional needs of students who experienced isolation and disconnection during COVID lockdowns and found the return to classrooms challenging. Opportunities to sing together in class have been valued as moments of joyful connection in addition to the well-understood positive impact on literacy, executive functioning and confidence.

Young people have delighted in returning to the theatre rehearsals, art workshops and choir rehearsals that they are so passionate about, rekindling face-to-face relationships that were kept alive during COVID-times through the extraordinary efforts of our facilitators. The many concerts, exhibitions, theatre performances and installations that were shared in 2022 were reasons to celebrate achievements and share often-unheard stories and perspectives.

It is important to note that we took time as an organisation in 2022 to dream big about our future. While we continue to steadily grow, through our strategic planning process we have made a firm commitment to hold on to everything that makes Bluebird unique and valued. Our core values of joy, inclusion and integrity will continue to guide us, ensuring that not only will Bluebird Foundation be a stronger, more sustainable organisation in five years time, we will also be continuing to make a real difference in people's lives.




MAPS OF THE HEART

In March 2022, North Youth Theatre was thrilled to present the much-anticipated season of Maps Of The Heart. Postponed twice due to COVID restrictions, the performance was worth the wait!

Maps Of The Heart told the stories of eight characters from different times and different countries based on the real experiences of cast members and their friends and families. Interwoven with the stories were the actors' reflections on who they are, where they have come from and how it feels to be living in a society that struggles to embrace difference.

Written by the ensemble and told through fast-paced, comedic theatre, Maps Of The Heart spanned the Congo, the Philippines, Iran, Vietnam, Rwanda and Tanzania and moved from the 1960s to the present day. Original music, song and rap drove the narrative to its surprising conclusion.

Directed by Dave Kelman and presented by North Youth Theatre, Maps Of The Heart included an original music score created by local award-winning composer Callum Watson.






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NORTH Children's Choir commissioned Corrina Bonshek to create a work especially for them with the brief to communicate a child's experience of growing up in multicultural Geelong. Corrina interviewed choir families and each chorister shared what makes Geelong special to them. 'Three Songs' highlights the sense of peace felt at the beach, the security of home and family, and the joy of childhood pleasures like jumping on the trampoline and riding the carousel.

The final collaborative mixed-media work was shared via augmented reality postcards and miniature artworks positioned around the streets of Geelong.





SINGINGLINKS

With the support of Bluebird Foundation, teachers and students from schools in Geelong's northern and eastern suburbs are raising their voices in song each day in the classroom. Weekly visits by a Bluebird facilitator are complemented with comprehensive resources delivered through the SingingLinks website. Teaching videos feature students from the classrooms and family connections are strengthened through take-home and online resources.

Anna Goldsworthy in an article for The Monthly recently pondered what would happen if big Pharma patented a single drug with the proven effects that music education provides (improvements to working memory, logic processing and literacy; the fostering of empathy; a reduction in depression and mental illness; and the enhancement of social cohesion, compassion and cooperation). "The benefits of music education are so well documented and so incontrovertible that it feels embarrassing even to mention them. Except no one ever seems to listen, so you just have to keep saying it."





MUSICSPACE THE MUSICAL

MusicSpace is an on-going weekly program for people to get involved in music. Anyone can join in at MusicSpace and in particular, it is a welcoming community for people who experience disability or disadvantage in any form. Experienced musicians and Registered Music Therapists support members to follow their interests, whether it is to learn an instrument, sing, write songs, play in a band, perform, record or just hang out with fellow music lovers.

In Term Four 2022, MusicSpace participants engaged in a series of workshops with puppeteer, Ian Cuming. The aim was to make and develop puppets for an end of year musical from a veritable mountain of recycled materials that were sourced from people's homes and Bluebird House.

lan began by demonstrating how a simple, everyday object like a cardboard box could be turned into a character once it begins to move around in space and make sound. After the initial demonstration was over, group members descended on the materials with gusto and all manner of creatures began to emerge. Characters began to take on a life, to move and to inspire songs and dances. This creative process continued to grow and evolve into a story and musical about a magical land which was performed on the 15th of December at Vines Rd Community Centre.






KIN

At first glance, Tarryn Love, Quinn Earthchild and Mutheinchri Ra seem worlds apart. Tarryn Love is a proud Gunditjmara Keeray Woorroong woman who has grown up on Wadawurrung country. As an artist she is committed to
exploring the theoretical and political value of First Nation arts practice. Quinn Earth Child is a queer permaculturalist, artist and musician, inspiring radical sustainable change in the Northern suburbs of Geelong. Mutheinchri is a
Karenni refugee, currently studying to become a NAATI certified translator. She is passionate about supporting her
local Karenni community to live their best lives here in Geelong. The common ground between the three is their
quiet leadership – young people living their ideals each day and inspiring change in the Geelong community. These
three young leaders have been recognised in a new installation created by Laura Alice, an extraordinary artist who
has created a name for herself through her inky paintings and street art. Laura, a long-time Bluebird collaborator,
has a passion for using art to share untold stories and through this project she highlighted the incredible diversity of
the Geelong community, shining a light on some of the young people quietly leading the way in our region.

The installation features portraits of Tarryn, Quinn and Mutheinchri surrounded by artistic elements created by the vibrant communities that hold them – Tarryn's mob, the Friends of Cowies Creek and the Drawn Together artistic collective. But just like the young people pictured, the cutting-edge mural involves more than is obvious at first glance. When visitors point their smart phone at the artwork, they are delighted by a magical augmented-reality show that harnesses the new wave of dual-reality artistic expression. The wall is brought to life by beautiful animations interwoven with music and the voices of the young leaders. Colours leap and swirl off the wall as if by magic, flowers bloom and birds emerge from the bricks and take wing into the sky, all weaving together into a joyful expression of togetherness and connection. The new installation takes pride of place on a large wall on the building at 17-19 Fenwick Street, Geelong owned by Elaine and Anthony Costa that was calling out for a better purpose and was unveiled during a launch event on Thursday 19th May.






OPEN WIDE ARMS

TREASURER'S REPORT



I am pleased to present Bluebird Foundation's 2022 financial statements which show the position of the Foundation. Following an uncertain 2021 of restrictions, 2022 saw the re-emergence and growth of programs. Bluebird Foundation is reliant on external funding and we acknowledge and thank our founder and Program Manager, Bron Lawson, who continues to create and nurture strong partnerships with philanthropic, government and non-government funders resulting in a small Net Loss in 2022 of \$9,413 and Net Assets of \$68,331.

Revenue significantly increased in 2022 given the lifting of many COVID restrictions and increased numbers of programs and workshops. Workshop fees increased from \$23,691 in 2021 to \$27,937 in 2022. Government funding increased from \$16,133 in 2021 to \$121,170 in 2022.

Bluebird Foundation remains in a good financial position to continue to deliver on its charter. Thank you to the volunteer Committee of Management for their ongoing support and to Glen Gardiner for auditing our 2022 finances pro bono. no. Thanks also to Di Moore, our bookkeeper, for managing our financial requirements.


